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PART I: FREEDOM TABLET INTERNATIONAL

1. Freedom Tablet International

Technology built for a human purpose.

Freedom Tablet International develops and delivers purpose-built digital education systems for governments, educational institutions, humanitarian organizations and communities around the world.

Our work begins with a simple idea: access to knowledge should not depend on geography, connectivity, infrastructure or circumstance.

We bring together purpose-built technology, educational content and international partnerships to create complete programs designed around the people and places they are intended to serve.

From early childhood education and national curriculum delivery to digital libraries, humanitarian learning, cultural preservation, civic education and community health, the Freedom Tablet platform can become something different wherever it is needed.

One technology platform. A world of possibilities.

2. Built for the Real World

Designed for the places conventional technology cannot always reach.

Most consumer technology begins with an assumption: reliable electricity, reliable internet and continuous connectivity. Much of the world cannot make that assumption. Freedom Tablets are designed differently.

They can deliver rich digital resources offline, operate in remote and infrastructure-limited environments, protect children from unrestricted internet access, support local languages and content, and be configured for the educational and social priorities of individual countries and communities.

The technology is deliberately simple from the user's perspective. What happens behind it can be remarkably sophisticated.

3. A Platform, Not a Product

The tablet is only the beginning.

The Freedom Tablet was never intended to be simply another piece of hardware. It is a platform through which education, knowledge and essential information can be delivered safely and reliably, wherever they are needed.

In the hands of a young child, it can become a first school. In a classroom, it can carry national curriculum, teacher resources and an entire educational library. In a remote community, it can preserve local language, stories and cultural knowledge. In a refugee settlement, it can allow a displaced child to continue learning when almost everything familiar has been left behind.

The same platform can serve very different purposes. It can support civic education and national communication, provide practical health information to families and community health workers, or place thousands of books into the hands of children who have never had access to a library.

What makes a Freedom Tablet valuable is not the device itself. It is what we are able to put inside it, where we are able to take it, and what people are able to do with it.

The tablet is simply the delivery platform.

4. Built Around People and Place

There is no universal edition of education.

Education belongs to the people it serves. Every country has its own curriculum and educational priorities. Every culture has its own stories and traditions. Communities have knowledge worth preserving, and every language carries something of the history and identity of the people who speak it.

For that reason, Freedom Tablet International does not approach the world with one finished educational product and expect everyone to adapt to it. We begin with the country, the community and the need.

We work alongside governments, educators, publishers, cultural organizations, humanitarian organizations and local partners to create programs that reflect the people who will actually use them. National curriculum remains national. Local publishers and creators can bring their own books and educational materials to the platform. Communities can preserve their languages, stories and cultural knowledge, while teachers gain new resources to strengthen the work they already do.

Our role is not to replace what already belongs to a country or community. It is to provide a platform capable of carrying it farther.

Countries own their future. We provide tools, technology, experience and support.

5. The Freedom Tablet Family

One platform. Designed for different lives.

There is no single Freedom Tablet because there is no single need. Our children's tablets create a safe environment for early learning and discovery, while youth editions expand into knowledge, skills, language, culture and preparation for the wider world. Lifeline tablets are designed to carry education into refugee communities, humanitarian settings and places where conventional infrastructure cannot be relied upon.

The same platform is expanding into health, providing practical information for clinics, health workers, women and families. Presentation and civic editions give governments and institutions a controlled way to share important information and educational resources, while cultural and national editions can be built around a country's own curriculum, languages, literature, history and identity.

Each may look different and contain an entirely different world inside, but they share the same underlying philosophy: technology should be designed around the people it is intended to serve.

And as the platform develops, Freedom SOLAR will take that principle one step further, allowing education and knowledge to travel beyond not only the internet, but the electrical grid itself.

It isn't one tablet. It is a family of platforms built around different human needs.



6. Complete Programs

We don't simply deliver devices.

A Freedom Tablet program can be as focused as providing a safe educational device to a child, or as comprehensive as helping a country build an entirely new digital learning system.

Depending on the project, we can bring together educational content, national or local curriculum, books and digital libraries, language resources, locally produced material, teacher resources, device configuration, secure content management, power solutions, implementation support and long-term program development.

Our delivery systems can extend beyond the individual tablet. Portable Education Centres can create learning environments where classrooms are unavailable or impractical, while Mobile Education Centres can take education directly to remote communities, villages, refugee settlements and other locations where access is difficult.

Offline also does not mean static. EduConnect provides a controlled bridge between an offline Freedom Tablet and the changing world around it. Approved curriculum, new books, language packages and educational resources can be added and updated without giving children unrestricted access to the internet. The result is not simply a tablet loaded with content. It is a program that can begin with the needs of one child, one classroom or one community and grow into a sustainable education system.

The device delivers the program. The program delivers the opportunity.

7. Built Through Partnership

Nothing meaningful at this scale is built alone.

Freedom Tablet International was built around partnership because lasting educational change depends upon far more than technology. It requires governments and ministries, educators and educational institutions, humanitarian organizations, foundations, publishers, cultural organizations, local businesses, technology and manufacturing partners, and most importantly, the communities themselves.

Our role changes with every partnership. In one country, we may provide the platform for a national education program. In another, we may help create a digital library, develop local-language resources or support teachers with new educational tools. In humanitarian settings, the priority may be taking learning into places where classrooms, connectivity and conventional infrastructure have disappeared.

We do not arrive with a predetermined answer. We begin by understanding what our partners want to accomplish and then determine what combination of technology, content, resources and support can help make it possible.

The strongest programs are those that ultimately belong to the people they serve.

Local ownership. International support.



8. From Technology to Purpose

**We built the technology.
But technology was never the destination.**

A Freedom Tablet can carry a school into a community without one. It can place a library in the hands of a child who has never owned a book. It can carry a language, preserve the stories of generations, support a teacher, connect a government with its people, or provide knowledge when conventional systems are simply out of reach.

The technology gives us the ability to do these things. What matters is what we choose to do with that ability.

Around the world, children are growing up without access to the educational resources others take for granted. Teachers are working without the tools they need. Communities are trying to preserve languages and knowledge that could disappear within a generation. Families are displaced by conflict and disaster. Entire populations remain beyond the practical reach of conventional digital education.

We built a platform capable of reaching them.

So we decided to take it everywhere.

PART II: THE FREEDOM TABLET INITIATIVE

9. Freedom in Action

Freedom begins when possibility is placed within reach.

The Freedom Tablet Initiative is Freedom Tablet International in action.

It is the expression of a simple belief: knowledge can change the course of a life, but only when people can reach it.

Around the world, children are ready to learn, teachers are determined to teach, communities are working to preserve their knowledge and culture, and nations are building toward a stronger future. What stands between them and possibility is different in every place.

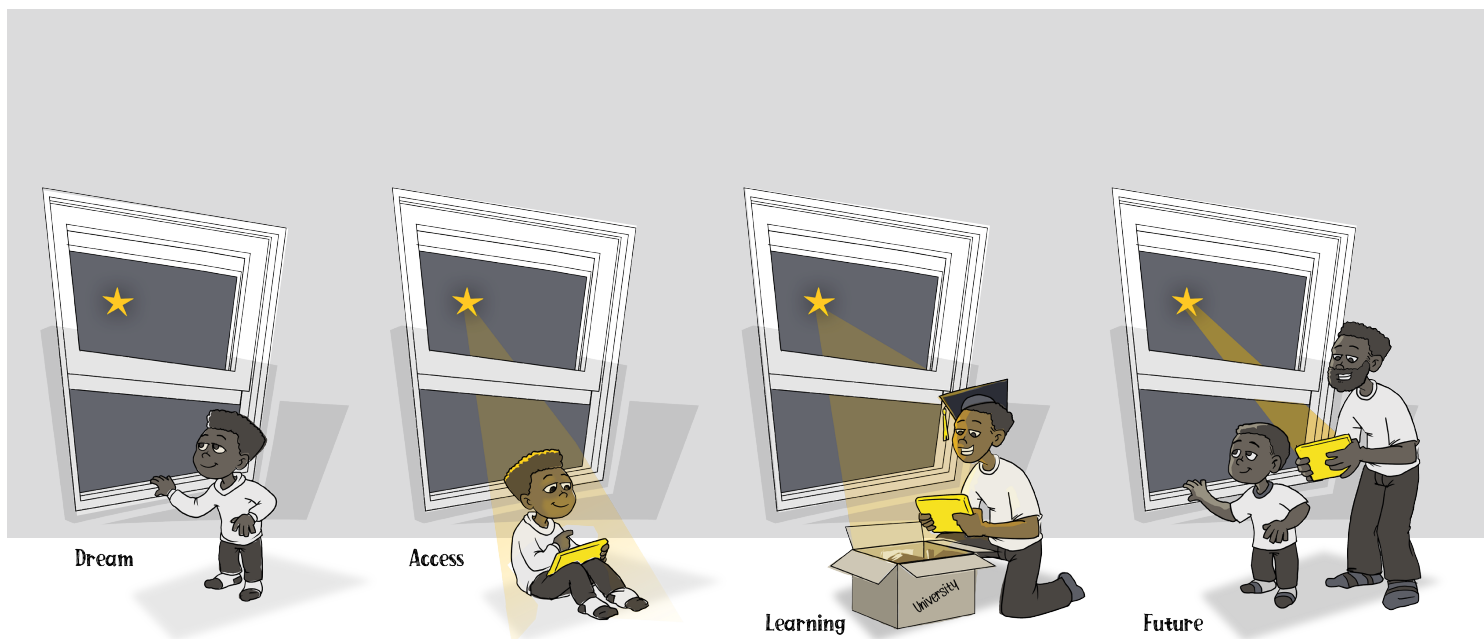
Sometimes it is distance. Sometimes poverty, conflict or displacement. Sometimes there are too few books, too few teachers or too little infrastructure. Sometimes electricity and internet access simply do not exist. And in highly connected parts of the world, the challenge may be giving children the benefits of technology without exposing them to its risks.

The Freedom Tablet Initiative exists to help remove those barriers.

Not with one program. Not with one answer. And not by telling communities what they need.

We begin with the need, then use education, technology, knowledge and partnership to help build the answer.

This is freedom in action.



10. Freedom Begins With Access

Possibility begins with what people can reach.

A child's future should never be determined by what happens to be within reach.

Yet millions of children continue to grow up separated from educational opportunity by geography, infrastructure, poverty, connectivity, conflict or circumstance.

What is missing is not intelligence, creativity, ambition or potential.

Too often, what is missing is access.

Access to knowledge. Access to books. Access to educational resources. Access to safe technology. Access to tools that can travel beyond cities, beyond electrical grids and beyond the reach of the internet.

That is where the Freedom Tablet Initiative begins.

Not with a device. Not with an imported answer. It begins with a child.



11. Knowledge Should Not Stop Where the Internet Ends

Learning should be able to travel anywhere.

A child's location should never determine the limits of that child's education.

Yet distance, cost, infrastructure, displacement and unreliable connectivity continue to separate millions of children from the knowledge they deserve.

The Freedom Tablet carries learning beyond those barriers. Into classrooms and homes. Into remote communities. Into refugee settlements and temporary learning spaces. Into places where books are scarce, electricity is uncertain and the internet may never arrive.

The knowledge can already be there.

Safe. Portable. Ready to travel.

Knowledge should not stop where the internet ends.

12. A Classroom With More to Give

**Technology that strengthens the teacher,
not replaces them.**

A great teacher can change a child's life. But even the greatest teacher cannot create books, equipment, specialists and classroom resources from nothing.

The Freedom Tablet does not replace the teacher. It stands beside the teacher.

It can bring stories, lessons, languages, music, science, mathematics, art and discovery into the room. It can give teachers resources that were previously unavailable and give children opportunities to explore, practise and learn at their own pace.

One classroom can hold a library. One teacher can reach further. One child can find another way to understand.

And one school can become a doorway to a much larger world.

Technology serves the relationship between teacher and child. It does not replace it.

13. What the Initiative Carries

One platform. Many pathways to freedom.

The Freedom Tablet Initiative is not a single education program. It is a platform capable of carrying many different answers.

For one child, the answer may be early learning. For another, it may be literacy, language, mathematics or access to books.

For a young person, it may be knowledge, identity, belonging and a safer path forward.

For a displaced family, it may be the opportunity to begin learning again.

For a teacher, it may be a classroom filled with resources that were previously beyond reach.

For a community, it may be the preservation of language, stories, culture and knowledge.

And for a nation, it may be national curriculum, civic understanding, a digital library, community education, cultural preservation or a new way to reach its people at home and around the world.

Every need is different. The answer should be different too.

The technology carries the program. The program answers the need.

PART III: THE INITIATIVES

14. Different Needs. Different Answers.

One platform. Many ways to make a difference.

The Freedom Tablet Initiative begins with a simple question:

What is standing between people and the knowledge they need?

The answer is different everywhere.

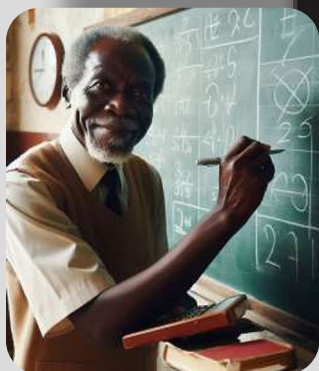
For one child, it may be the absence of books. For another, there may be no classroom nearby. A teacher may have a room full of eager students but too few resources. A displaced family may need a way for children to begin learning again. A community may be watching its language and stories disappear. A government may need a practical way to deliver education or important information across an entire country.

There is no reason these different problems should have the same answer.

The Freedom Tablet platform allows us to create initiatives around specific needs, populations and places. Some can begin with a single community. Others can become national or international programs.

What connects them is not what they contain, but what they are intended to accomplish.

Remove the barrier. Put possibility within reach.



15. Freedom Education Initiative

Education built around the child, not the connection.

The Freedom Education Initiative is the foundation of our work with children and young people.

It brings together purpose-built Freedom Education Tablets, secure offline technology and flexible education programs designed for different ages, communities and learning environments.

At its core are two devices:



Freedom Education Tablet – Child

Designed primarily for younger children, with a protected digital environment built around early learning, literacy, numeracy, creativity, stories and exploration.



Freedom Education Tablet – Youth

Designed for older children and young people, expanding the learning environment to support broader curriculum, independent study, digital skills, reference resources, creativity and age-appropriate exploration.

But the Freedom Education Initiative is not simply two tablets.

Each tablet can become the foundation for different education programs depending upon the needs of the country, school or community. Programs can combine curriculum, libraries, language learning, literacy and numeracy, cultural content, teacher resources, locally developed materials and specialized learning applications.

The same underlying platform can therefore support a preschool program, a classroom resource, an offline school system, a language-learning program, a community learning centre or a nationally configured education solution.

Content can be adapted for language, culture, curriculum and local priorities while retaining the secure, managed Freedom Tablet environment.

One Platform. Many Pathways to Learning. The objective is not to determine what every child should learn. It is to give governments, educators and communities a flexible platform through which they can build the education experience their children need.

16. Freedom Children's Library

A library within reach of every child.

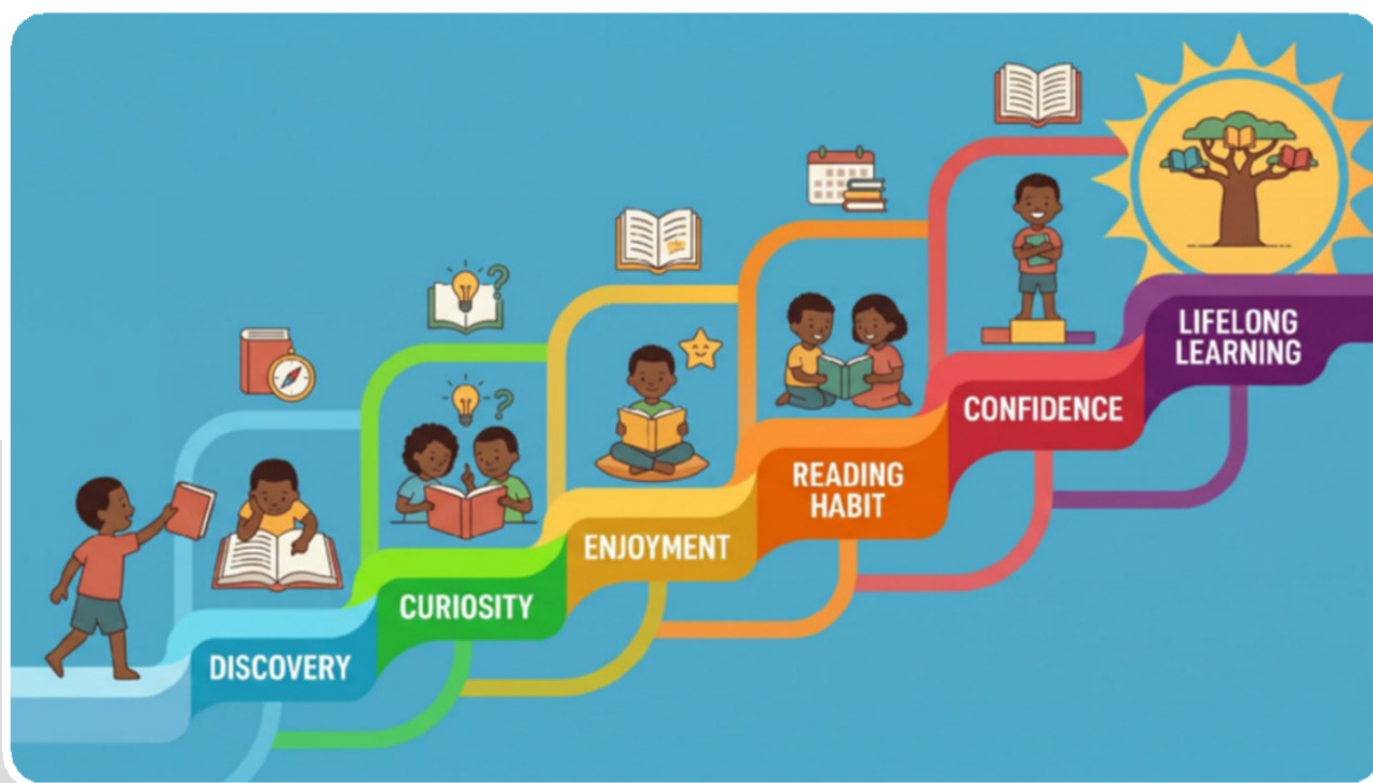
Books open worlds. They build language, imagination, curiosity and understanding. Yet millions of children grow up with little or no access to books of their own.

Freedom Children's Library is an initiative to change that.

A Freedom Tablet can carry hundreds or thousands of books into a child's home, classroom or community without requiring continuous internet access. Collections can include stories, reference materials, educational books, local literature, audio resources and age-appropriate learning materials.

But a children's library should do more than bring the world's stories to a child. It should also allow children to discover stories from their own country, hear their own languages and recognize their own lives and culture in what they read.

Every child deserves a library.



17. African Children's Library

A library for every child. A home for Africa's stories.

Africa is home to extraordinary linguistic, literary and cultural wealth. It is also home to oral traditions that have carried knowledge between generations for centuries.

The African Children's Library is being created to preserve, celebrate and share that inheritance with Africa's children.

It can bring together children's books, stories told by elders, traditional songs and music, oral histories, local legends and heroes, educational resources, language preservation projects and cultural knowledge from across the continent. Every participating country can contribute its own books, languages, history and traditions while building a library that reflects its own national identity.

The African Children's Library is not intended to import a library into Africa. It is intended to help collect, preserve and make accessible the enormous library Africa already possesses.

**It is not simply a library. It is Africa's memory.
Created by Africans. Owned by Africans. Governed by Africans. Built for African children.**

18. Freedom Classroom

A school can begin almost anywhere.

A classroom does not have to begin with a building.

It can begin with a teacher, a small group of children, a collection of Freedom Tablets, educational resources and a source of power.

Freedom Classroom is designed to create or strengthen learning environments where conventional classroom resources are limited, overcrowded, damaged or simply unavailable. It can support schools and teachers, remote communities, temporary learning spaces and other settings where children need education but infrastructure stands in the way.

The program can bring together curriculum, books, teacher resources, educational content, shared learning tools, charging and power solutions, and the technology required to keep the learning environment current while remaining safely offline.

It can begin small and grow with the community.

A room is useful. Learning is essential.



19. Lifeline

When life is interrupted, learning must not disappear.

Conflict, disaster and displacement can take away a child's home, school, familiar routines and certainty about tomorrow.

Lifeline is designed for those moments.

Portable, offline and adaptable, Lifeline programs can carry literacy, numeracy, language learning, health information, practical life skills, books and pathways back into formal education. They can travel with humanitarian organizations into refugee settlements, temporary communities and places where conventional educational systems have been disrupted.

Education cannot restore everything a child has lost.

But it can restore routine. It can restore choice. It can create a connection to the life that existed before and to the future that can still come after.

Learning can help hope begin moving again.



20. National Education Systems

National in ownership. Unlimited in reach.

Freedom Tablet technology can support much more than individual learning programs. It can become part of a country's broader educational infrastructure.

Working with ministries, educators and national partners, programs can incorporate national curriculum, textbooks, educational libraries, teacher resources, local languages, assessments and locally created materials within a common digital platform.

The same system can be adapted for different ages, regions, languages and educational priorities while maintaining national control over what children learn.

A country does not have to choose between preserving its own educational system and benefiting from new technology.

The technology adapts to the education system, not the education system to the technology.



21. Presentation & Civic Programs

Knowledge can connect a nation with its people.

Education is not limited to the classroom.

Freedom Presentation and civic programs provide governments and institutions with another way to communicate knowledge, explain public institutions and services, support civic understanding and strengthen connections between people and their communities.

Programs can be created for particular national purposes, including civic education, community learning, diaspora engagement, cultural connection and information intended for specific populations.

Sometimes the need is highly specific. A country may want to reconnect with citizens living abroad, encourage skilled members of its diaspora to return, strengthen cultural ties or create greater understanding of national opportunities.

In those cases, the program can have its own identity, its own audience and its own message.

Sometimes the message must have a name.



22. Freedom From Extremism

Some children need more than a lesson.

Knowledge alone does not always protect a young person.

Children and youth also need identity, belonging, confidence, judgement, opportunity and meaningful choices. Where young people are vulnerable to manipulation, exploitation or recruitment, education can help provide something powerful in return: another future.

Freedom Tablet programs can combine learning with carefully developed material that strengthens critical thinking, identity and resilience while helping young people understand risk and discover alternatives to violence and exploitation.

The approach is not built around fear. It is built around possibility.

Programs such as Gaashaan demonstrate how an initiative can be designed around the particular circumstances of a country and its young people.

A young person with knowledge, purpose and a place to belong is far harder to recruit into someone else's cause.



23. Culture, Language & Memory

What disappears from memory can disappear forever.

Knowledge is not found only in textbooks.

It lives in languages, stories, songs, traditions, family histories and the memories of elders. Much of that knowledge has never been written down, and when the people carrying it are gone, it can disappear with them.

Freedom initiatives can help communities record, preserve and share that knowledge with future generations. Oral histories can be captured. Languages can be taught and heard. Stories can be preserved in the voices of the people who know them. Books, music, art and historical material can become part of living digital collections.

Technology cannot create cultural identity. It can help people protect what is already theirs.

Preserving knowledge means preserving a connection between generations.

24. Health & Human Development

Knowledge can also protect a life.

Access to practical, understandable health information can be as important as access to education.

The Freedom platform can be adapted to support clinics, community health workers, families and specialized populations with carefully selected offline information that remains available even where connectivity and medical resources are limited.

Programs can support maternal and child health, women's health, nutrition, hygiene, prevention, family wellbeing, community health education and training resources for frontline workers.

As these initiatives develop, the principle remains the same as it is throughout the Freedom Tablet Initiative: identify the knowledge people need, work with appropriate experts and local partners to build it, and make that knowledge accessible where it can do the most good.

Sometimes access to knowledge creates opportunity. Sometimes it can protect a life.



PART IV: A WORLD OF PARTNERSHIPS

25 . Every Country Writes Its Own Chapter One vision.

National in expression.

No two countries begin in the same place.

Each has its own languages, curriculum, history, culture, educational system, infrastructure, priorities and challenges. For that reason, the Freedom Tablet Initiative is not a program that is simply duplicated from one country to another.

One country may begin with early learning. Another may need national curriculum resources or teacher support. Another may place its priority on refugee education, youth protection, civic learning, language preservation or a national children's library.

The Initiative provides a common platform from which very different national programs can be built. Governments and local partners determine what matters most, what belongs inside and how the program should develop.

The result is not our version of their country.

The Initiative provides the framework. The country gives it voice.

26. Freedom Tablet Initiative: Africa

A continental vision.

Africa is where many of the ideas behind the Freedom Tablet Initiative have come together most powerfully.

Across the continent, extraordinary human potential exists alongside enormous differences in educational access. Rural isolation, shortages of books and classroom resources, unreliable electricity and connectivity, displacement and language diversity can all create barriers. Yet Africa also possesses extraordinary educational, cultural and intellectual resources of its own.

The Freedom Tablet Initiative: Africa is designed to help close the distance between the two.

It brings together education, technology, digital libraries, cultural preservation, humanitarian learning, youth programs and national initiatives within a framework that each country can shape around its own priorities.

Africa does not lack intelligence, creativity, courage, culture or possibility.

What has too often been missing is access.

27. Country Partnerships

Partnership begins with listening.

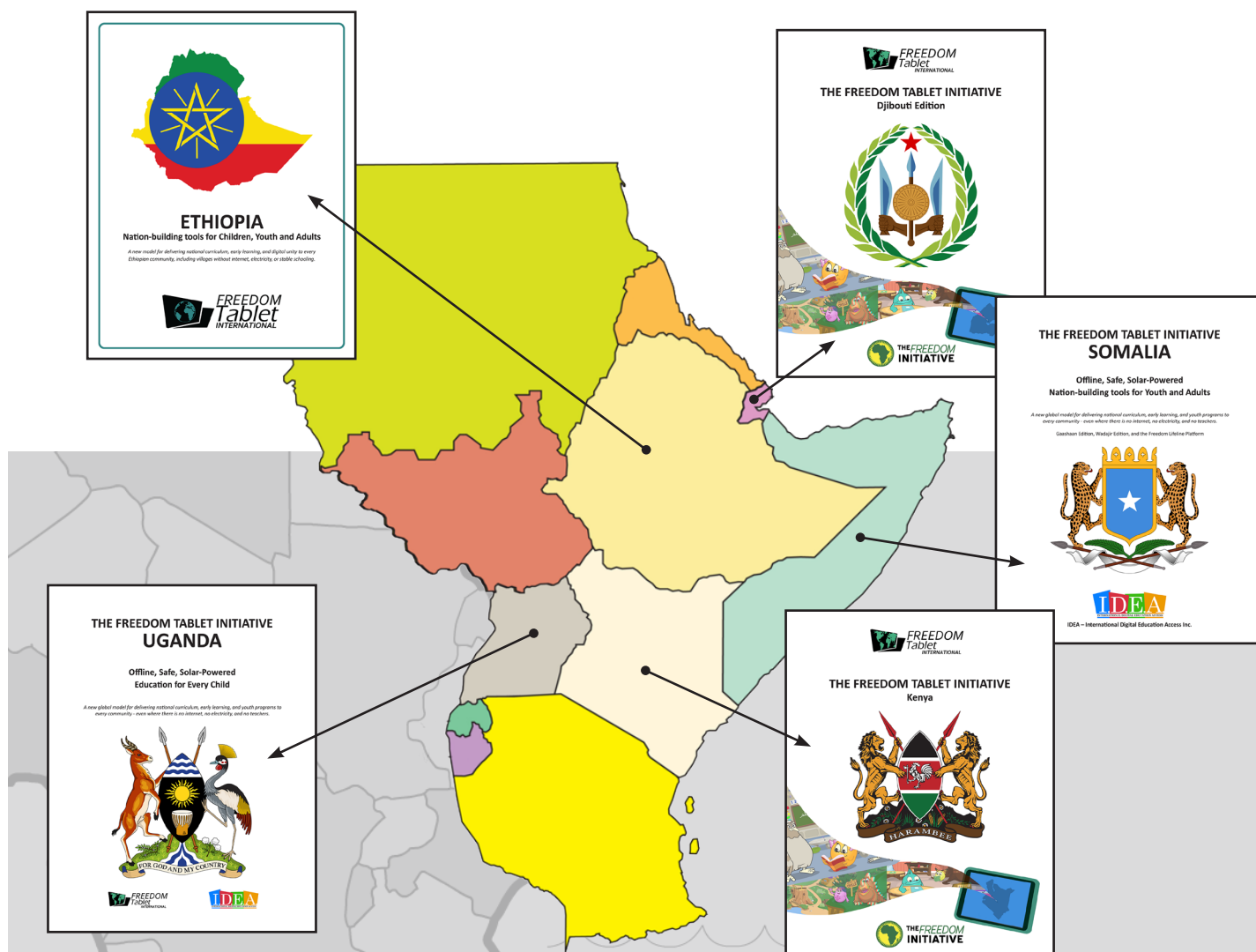
Our country partnerships begin with a conversation, not a catalogue.

We work with governments, educators and local partners to understand what they are trying to accomplish and where the greatest barriers exist. From there, a program can be built around national priorities, drawing upon the parts of the Freedom platform that are useful and leaving aside those that are not.

A country partnership may begin with one project and grow over time. Early childhood education may lead to teacher resources. A children's library may grow into a national knowledge platform. A humanitarian program may reveal a broader opportunity for youth or community education.

Each partnership develops differently because each country is different.

Every country writes its own chapter.



28. Humanitarian & Displacement Partnerships

Education must be able to travel.

Conflict, disaster and displacement rarely occur where educational infrastructure is easy to rebuild.

That makes partnership essential.

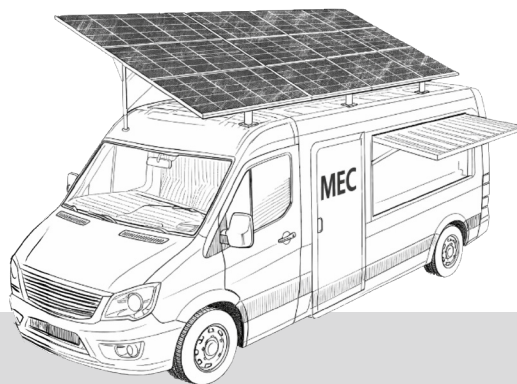
Freedom Tablet International can work with humanitarian organizations, governments, refugee agencies, foundations and local communities to bring portable education into environments where conventional classrooms, electricity and internet connectivity may be unavailable.

Programs can support children whose schooling has been interrupted, teachers working in temporary learning environments and families rebuilding their lives far from home. Lifeline tablets, portable learning systems, libraries and locally appropriate educational resources can be combined according to the circumstances.

The goal is not simply to deliver equipment into a crisis.

It is to help restore access to learning and create a pathway back toward educational continuity.

When people are forced to move, knowledge must be able to move with them.



29. National & Institutional Partnerships

Large change requires strong partners.

Some opportunities extend far beyond an individual classroom or community.

Freedom Tablet International works with governments, ministries, educational institutions, foundations, publishers, cultural organizations and other major partners to develop programs capable of operating at regional or national scale.

These partnerships can encompass national curriculum, teacher resources, children's libraries, language programs, civic and community education, specialized national initiatives and the technology required to deliver them.

Our role is not to displace existing institutions. It is to strengthen their ability to reach people.

The most sustainable programs combine national leadership and local knowledge with technology and international support.

Build with the institutions that will carry the work forward.

30. North America: Freedom Through Safety

Here, the barrier is different.

In much of the world, the challenge is getting technology and knowledge into children's hands.

In North America, technology is already everywhere.

Children have unprecedented access to information, entertainment and communication, but that access also brings advertising, distraction, inappropriate content, privacy concerns, addictive design and unrestricted contact with the wider online world.

The Freedom approach therefore changes.

Here, freedom is not primarily about overcoming the absence of technology. It is about giving children the benefits of digital learning without requiring them to enter an unrestricted digital environment.

A Freedom Tablet can provide books, educational programs, creativity, discovery and rich digital experiences while allowing parents and educators to remain in control of what enters the child's world.

The technology is different because the need is different. The principle is exactly the same.

**Around the world, freedom can mean access.
In North America, freedom can mean safety.
Different needs. Different answers.**

PART V: HOW THE WORLD IS BUILT

31. The Knowledge Behind the Platform

Technology can only carry what we give it to carry.

Behind the Freedom Tablet platform is more than two decades of educational development by International Digital Education Access Inc. (IDEA).

That work has created a growing body of original educational intellectual property, including early learning environments, literacy and numeracy programs, language learning, stories, characters, music, educational games, libraries and specialized learning systems.

These resources give Freedom Tablet International something unusual: we do not have to begin every new initiative with an empty device.

Existing educational systems can provide the foundation. New curriculum, languages, books, cultural material and specialized programs can then be created with local educators, publishers and partners to meet the needs of a particular country or initiative.

The result is a platform that can continue to grow as new knowledge, new partnerships and new ideas are added.

The technology carries knowledge. IDEA helps give us something worth carrying.

32. Human Creativity

Children deserve worlds created for them by people.

Education is more than information. Children learn through stories, characters, music, humour, imagination, play and the emotional connections they make with the worlds around them.

Hugz Entertainment brings that human creative dimension to the Freedom ecosystem.

Writers, artists, musicians, animators, educators and other creative professionals can transform educational objectives into experiences children want to explore. Existing worlds can continue to grow, while entirely new characters, stories and programs can be developed for different cultures, languages and educational needs.

Technology may provide the canvas, but imagination gives it life.

Human stories. Human imagination. Human intelligence.

33. Technology & Manufacturing

Purpose-built from the inside out.

Freedom Tablets are not simply consumer devices filled with educational applications. The technology is being developed around the environments, programs and people it is intended to serve.

Freedom Tablet Manufacturing brings together device development, manufacturing, charging and power solutions, secure deployment technology and the continuing development of off-grid and solar capability.

That allows the physical platform to evolve alongside the programs it carries, from individual children's tablets to classroom and humanitarian systems designed for deployment at scale.

As new needs emerge, the technology can evolve with them.

Built for the program. Built for the environment. Built for the people who will use it.

34. Freedom Tablet International

Bringing it all together.

Knowledge alone cannot reach a child. Technology alone cannot create an education system. A device alone cannot build a national program.

Freedom Tablet International brings the pieces together.

We work with the educational resources and intellectual property developed through IDEA, the human creative capability of Hugz, the technology and manufacturing capability of FTM, and most importantly, the governments, educators, organizations and communities with whom each program is built.

FTI turns those capabilities into complete programs and takes them into the world.

Different partners may contribute different pieces. Different countries may require entirely different solutions. New initiatives will create needs we have not yet imagined.

That is precisely why the model was built this way.

IDEA creates the knowledge.
Hugz brings it to life.
FTM builds the technology.
FTI takes it into the world.

PART VI: THE WORLD AHEAD

35. One Platform. Unlimited Possibility.

We have only begun to discover what it can carry.

The Freedom Tablet began with education, but access to knowledge touches almost every part of human life.

The same platform that carries a child's first lesson can carry a national library. It can preserve the voice of an elder, help a refugee child return to learning, give a teacher resources for a crowded classroom, provide health knowledge to a family, connect a nation with its diaspora or carry an entire curriculum beyond the reach of the internet.

Tomorrow it will carry things we have not yet imagined.

That is the opportunity created by a platform designed around needs rather than products. As new partners bring new ideas, the Freedom ecosystem can continue to grow with them.

We do not know every initiative that will eventually emerge.

That is part of the possibility.

36. Locally Led. Internationally Supported.

The future should belong to the people building it.

The Freedom Tablet Initiative is international in reach, but its programs are intended to become increasingly local in character and ownership.

Countries determine their educational priorities. Educators understand their classrooms. Publishers know their literature. Communities know their culture. Elders carry their stories. Parents understand their children. Local organizations understand the realities on the ground.

Our role is to listen, contribute what we have learned, provide technology and resources, and help build systems capable of carrying that local knowledge farther.

International collaboration can provide tools, experience and opportunity.

But lasting change must have roots.

The Initiative provides the framework. The country gives it voice.

Every initiative begins with a conversation.

The scale of the challenge is too large, and the possibilities too great, for any one organization to work alone.
